An early form of social media. Anyone could inscribe their name, message or image on to a surface. Graffiti 1.0 had downsides. It took time too scratch marks in to stone or wood. These were messages designed to last due to the effort involved. They have survived, etched on the fabric of buildings and monuments, once contemporary, now historic.

Graffiti 2.0 employed more temporary media, paint, ink, mediums that would only mark the surface, easily eroded. The process of creating marks accelerated, allowing for more fleeting messages, designed only to last a short space of time. Political, angst, seditious, love, loss and the odd.

Graffiti 2.1 employs stencils to replicate messages. Thought out before the protagonist leaves the house. Spontaneity lost. A clear agenda, where subtle nuances encountered on the way to the canvas mean nothing.
